ScotCon 1 – Part of the Diplomacy ‘Tour of Britain’ (Dave Simpson)

Tournament Director David Wigglesworth hosted ScotCon 1 as the first ever event in a Diplomacy Tour of Britain over the weekend of 26th - 28th February 2010. This was a small tournament, with 7 players playing three rounds, but the breakdown of the players was interesting. There were 3 players who had regularly played at Cons over the past 3-4 years, one returning player who was back after a 4 year gap, 2 players who were email only to that point and one player who'd only played once before. That alone was seen to be a success, as the stated aim of the UKF2FDip initiative is to encourage both new players into the F2F hobby and old players to come back to the hobby. This was also the first tournament to be held in Scotland for a number of years! (There may well have been tournaments held there before, but the European Diplomacy Association website does not number them amongst its 1301 entries).

I was able to take a swift look around Edinburgh before the Con and took in the delights of Edinburgh Castle (which would be a great venue for a DipCon by the way). There was snow on the ground in parts of the City and the days were crisp!

The Con itself was played using the familiar ManorCon scoring system, albeit shorter games than ManorCon finishing after 1908.

The first round was preceded by a bite to eat in the Morning(side) Glory pub, which is a cracking boozier, with a range of traditional Scottish fare on offer (sadly not consumed by the player who was later to be awarded the “Most Scottish Player who isn’t Scottish” award. Referee!!). The game itself saw an attempted Western triple by myself (F), Julie (E) and Brian (G), who were regular, new and returning players, respectively. This left me attacking John (I) who was also pressed by TD and Con regular David (A). Email player Jim (T) displaced Graeme (R) who ended up finishing the game in German centres as Brian went out. Not to be outdone, John ended the game with an Italian army in Paris! The game finished as a 4 way tie, with David, Julie, Jim and I all on 7 centres.

The second round saw Brian draw Italy and on the back of an exit the day before, he arranged for the swift exit of Jims Austria. David (R) and John (T) joined in with gusto! In the West, Graeme (F) and I (E) combined to attack Russia and Germany. Turkey had another relatively strong result as Russia again ended up being displaced west and Germany was eliminated for the second game running. Graeme topped the board with 9 dots to Dave’s 8, with Brian and John on 7 each.

After 2 days, England, France and Turkey seemed to be the powers to draw if you wanted to do well. I was leading the tournament with a slender lead over Graeme and Brian had caught up after a bad first day. The three of us headed out for a rather nice chinese, but we knew that everyone else was still in with a shout of the win (just not to get any aromatic duck!).

Day 3 dawned. I drew Germany (gulp!) with Brian as France and Graeme as Turkey. I figured that they both had a good chance to pass me. I knew that Brian was hoping to finish 3rd or better and as such was gunning for David (who was England). I was able to work with Brian and David’s days were numbered. Over in the East, Graeme’s now famous opening of Con-Arm caused him some issues! John (A) bounced him out of Bul in the fall and Jim (R) worked with him to take Graeme out. Julie’s Italy got stuck between faster growing powers and Brian was doing very well. So much so that I had to have a little stab to make sure he was not going to win the tournament outright. He still topped the board with 11 to my 9, so that left me with a healthy lead over Brian who was a strong second overall. Jim finished on 7 to John’s 6, but that was not quite enough for him to displace John in the Scottish Champion competition (open only to those players resident in

Scotland) Congratulations to John, who was also best newcomer. The tournament would not have taken place had Julie not stepped in to the breach and as such she deserved her TD's award!

Board 1 saw an Austria-Italy alliance that worked out rather better for Austria than for Italy! Dan's 17 centre Austria is all the more impressive for the fact that the game had a 1909 time-draw, and his score of 61.75 smashed the record for the highest ever score for a non-solo – a reflection of the 12 centre lead he had over every other power.

On the other board, an Austria-Turkey alliance was bad news for both Italy and Russia, while in the North, a France-Germany alliance was equally bad news for England.

Saturday saw three boards, although a couple of players had to play two boards at once to make this possible. Board 1 saw a rush to 10 centres by Turkey, and 9 centres by France, before the draw was agreed in 1906. Board 2 started off with Germany looking like he would get a big score, but as the rest of the board turned around to try and slow him down, Turkey took advantage of some open backs to race to 14 centres in the last few years. And on board 3, And England-Germany alliance was making good progress until England left himself too open, and dropped from 7 to 3 in one year. Some commentators thought that a German solo was a possibility, but the combination of good defence and some sub-optimal play kept Germany down to 16 before the time-draw was called.

Of particular note is Mark Stretch's scores. Playing two boards at once, he amassed 23 centres between his two countries!

This year has seen a significant rise in the number of players in the Diplomacy Tournament, not least because of the efforts of Dave Simpson to rebuild the hobby. And Finally...

The numbers of attendees in 2010 was 25 up on 2009, with 226 attendees. There were 192 on Friday, 223 on Saturday, 206 on Sunday, and 140 on Monday. The number of rooms used was 162, up by 19 compared with 2009. Around 48% of bookings received were via the Internet, and 52% continued to book by post.

The Tour of Britain – a UKF2FDip initiative (Dave Simpson)

MidCon has traditionally hosted the UK National Diplomacy Championship, so has a long and distinguished connection with “The Game”. However, as a brand new addition for 2010, the diplomacy tournament at MidCon will also mark the culmination of the first year of a series of tournaments that are collectively known as “The Tour of Britain”.

Modelled on the successful Diplomacy tours that operate in many other countries across the world, the “Tour of Britain” is designed to showcase the game of Diplomacy in its original face-to-face format and to give as many players as possible the opportunity to play competitively. The tour has been successful in increasing the number of diplomacy boards played at conventions in the UK, in bringing a number of new players in to the hobby and also in revitalising the interest of quite a few old hands. Additionally, new DipCons in Edinburgh and Brighton have been founded to stage steps of the Tour of Britain.
