Editorial (Jeremy Tullett)

As we ran up to the Christmas holidays, people wishing me a relaxing Christmas generally got growled at, as relaxing was perhaps not quite what I was anticipating with non-trivial amounts of driving in prospect in both fetching and then returning my parents before and after Christmas, and also zooming up to Co. Durham, however chilled the events themselves at Christmas and New Year might have been promising to be.

However, my management skills cut in, and I contrived to arrange for other bodies to provide the entertainment for me and my guests, those bodies being Derby Theatre, the Birmingham Symphony Hall, the Bowes Museum, Standard Fireworks Ltd., and Seaham Hall.

Derby Theatre had a production of Cinderella, as told from the point of view of the kitchen rats. Neither a pantomime nor a play, but something in-between, this family entertainment provided some fluffy amusement on Christmas Eve, and, given that it was aimed at families with older children, there were actually very few children of any age present.

Off to the Symphony Hall on the 28th to hear the Four Seasons¹ by candlelight, in period dress². I think most people are aware of certain elements of programming in the named movements, but the conductor explained how the score is actually marked in some detail indicating what certain phrases refer to (barking dogs, rain on the roof, country dances, etc.). This was quite fun, and a number of other pieces of Baroque music were performed also, all in the magnificent Symphony Hall.

Standard Fireworks provided the entertainment at midnight on New Year's Eve, and I found a slightly impish streak as I let off the rockets and Roman Candles. Everyone was very impressed, apart from a local owl that flew past, irritation emanating from the very flapping of his wings.

Seaham Hall was converted into a very expensive hotel and restaurant around 2000, and we went there a few times, but have not returned for a while. As there is now a new owner and a new chef, we thought we go back again for dinner on New Year's Day and see what has changed. The main bar is now the dining room, and the dining room has been converted into a bar, a lounge, and, of all things a sports bar. Yes, a sports bar, in a five star hotel. Standards are slipping.

The menu has been simplified somewhat, but was perfectly good. However, we had to share an ice bucket with the adjacent table because the restaurant had 'lost' some. One of the waiters solved the problem by pouring the remainder of the wine without asking us, therefore obviating our need for the bucket. Hmmm.

The Bowes Museum (at Barnard Castle) is a collection of art and crafts that was created by, and housed in

a building commissioned by, John and Josephine Bowes in the late 19th century. It also houses modern, temporary exhibitions, currently comprising: quilts, some Mapplethorpe photographs, and a display of entries to the New Light art competition.

Its centre piece, which used stand in the hallway, but has now been moved, is a large articulated silver swan that moves under the power of three clock mechanisms. It is 240 years old, and is shown in action daily. After the demonstration, during which the curator explained very clearly how it operated, one witless teenager asked if it was computer controlled. Do we actually educate *anyone* these days?

So it turned out to be quite an interesting and relaxing break after all, despite my grumpy prognostications.

MidCon 2015 Report (Jeremy Tullett)

I think I can now safely say that this was the biggest ever MidCon. I have never known how big MidCon was at its previous peak, but it certainly used to support a conference room full of Diplomacy boards, and then some. In 2015 we had just under 240 registrations.

We made a decision quite close to the event to hire the meeting room at the Hallmark Inn for the Bring 'n' Buy, thus releasing the Milldale Suite for general gaming throughout the weekend, and what a good decision that turned out to be!

There were spells when there were people wandering around looking for tables, and some frayed tempers at attempts to beach-towel gaming space, but there was in fact a table that was never used for gaming on any day, in plain sight, in one of the gaming rooms. However it remains clear that we shall indisputably need to find yet more space for 2016.

We are exploring options, but the view from the Chair is that the simplest and least risky solution will be to claim more space at the Hallmark Inn (we have been offered use of the dining room there, after breakfast is finished). Other ideas being kicked about are (1) hiring a heated marquee for the hotel garden (probably way too expensive) or (2) block-booking the entire hotel (which exposes MidCon to a significant financial risk).

There's no contract in place yet, but the dates are confirmed as **11–13 November 2016**.

Aside from the issue of space, we are not aware of any problems of note. A mix-up in the kitchen meant that Friday lunch (and access to the real ale) were delayed by nearly an hour, but hardly anyone seems to have noticed, and the committee subsequently overestimated demand for further polypins of ale, leaving Dave Simpson having to take one home in his car, and me to take about a half of a polypin home on foot.

Mr. Harrington has reviewed the comments left on BoardGameGeek, and we conclude that we need more (or even some) rubbish bags, and that we need some way of bringing together players looking for games – a particular difficulty for people who have never been to a convention before. We may assign a duty committee member specifically to this task.

The portable table lamps were a partial success for illuminating table with less light than people may have wished for – we just need more tables!

There were also some grumbles about the timing of the Bring 'n' Buy mid-morning causing interruptions to games in progress, so we may move the time to be close to the end of breakfast.

An innovation that was surprisingly (to me, at any rate) successful was the Kniziathon, masterminded by Ben Bateson, to whom many thanks. His report follows, and I look forward to seeing him do it again next year.

David Norman did a splendid bit of crowd control in running the quiz, and his report also follows.

All in all, our 2015 event seems to have been something of a triumph, and rising numbers suggest that we are doing something right. I look forward to seeing you all again in November, by which time I shall once again have forgotten who most of you are!

Is Reiner Knizia my favourite designer? No. Is he the best designer in the world? Possibly not. But who else's oeuvre could provide enough to keep a whole room entertained for a day? And how many people picked through the games table with a surprised: "Oh, I didn't realise that was one of HIS!" Therein lies

Yorkshire DipCon is now back for its third year as part of the Tour of Britain and will take place once again at The University of Hull's Lawns Centre in the village of Cottingham, which is located on the outskirts of Hull.

The Diplomacy tournament will consist of 4 rounds and these will take place on the Friday evening, Saturday morning/early afternoon, Saturday evening and Sunday morning/early afternoon.

The games will take place in two meeting rooms within the Lawns Centre that will be available for our sole use 24 hours per day throughout the whole weekend. This will provide lots of chance to play some other games once the Diplomacy has finished for the day. This will include the Sunday night for those players leaving on the Monday. Outside areas and tables will be available for Dip Discussions and gaming should the weather be summery enough.

Please note that rooms will also be available within the Ferens Hall accommodation blocks if players want to game nearer to their bedrooms.

Following on from last year's successful convention, ManorCon will once again be held at the University of Leicester. Whilst the accommodation is the same as in 2015 at John Foster Hall, **the gaming halls have moved over the road into Stamford Court** due to renovations taking place in other parts of the Oadby campus.

Please note, ManorCon does not start until 2pm on Friday. In recent years, people have been arriving earlier and earlier, to the extent that it has started to interfere with the convention preparation on Friday morning. In 2016, we also have a new venue to contend with, so we will not be allowing entry to the convention before noon on Friday.

As ever, single accommodation is available at the convention. All John Foster Hall rooms are en-suite rooms. These will cost £36 per night, and £7 per night extra if you don't book in advance. As always, you are therefore recommended to book early to guarantee a room.

For those people who want twin accommodation, we recommend The Regency Hotel, which is just under a mile from the convention.
