'Robin' a New Convention in Nottingham

This took place on the 17 February at the Nottingham Tennis Centre. It made it on to the front page of the last issue of QLA and was described as a long-running war games convention trying to attract a more general gaming audience. Anyone got any reports on this?

Editorial (Jeremy Tullett)

Sir John Soane and Dr Samuel Johnson. An unlikely coupling.

Sir John Soane (1753-1837) was an English architect, who designed the Bank of England (demolished in the 1930s) and Dulwich art gallery. During the early 19th century he successively purchased 12, 13, and 14 Lincoln's Inn Fields, both as places to live in, and as a place to store his extensive collection of architectural models, casts and drawings.

In 1833, he arranged for Act of Parliament to be passed to ensure that his houses and his collection would be preserved in perpetuity, with free access to the public.

Sir John Soane's Museum, as it now is, is one of the more unusual and lesser-known museums in London, and well worth a visit if you like That Sort of Thing.

The rooms within the original structures are fine examples of late-Georgian design and decoration, and would be worth a visit on their own, but the main feature of the museum is at the back of the premises, where Sir John replaced the stables and the yard with a purpose built, cunningly designed, display area for his eclectic collection, which is also eclectically arranged. There is, quite literally, a surprise around every corner, and there are plenty of corners.

There is a small gallery, containing several Canalettos, but the pictures are mounted, floor to ceiling, on large, hinged, boards, so the (small room) holds considerably more pictures, than the wall space alone would suggest. The room is sufficiently small that the frames are only moved when there's only a curator in the room, and at set times of day.

The other highlight is held to be the sarcophagus of Seti I. This looks like a discoloured bathtub to me, but there are plenty more interesting items to peer at on the way around the passages.

Not far away, in Gough Square, is the house of Samuel Johnson. It's main point of interest being that it is one of the few late 17th century houses still standing in the City of London. (Dr Johnson actually lived at several London addresses during his lifetime.) It was restored by magnate Cecil Harmsworth, and opened to the public in 1914.

It is a considerably less sophisticated residence than that of Sir John Soane, but interesting for all that, and contains a few memorabilia of Dr. Johnson and his dictionary, which is held to be the most influential (although not the first) English dictionary published.

Gough Square is located at the end of one of a number of narrow alleyways running off of Fleet Street, and it was really only when I visited recently that I became aware just how much of the medieval street plan still exists in the City. The house is erratically signposted, and quite hard to find, even with the aid of a maps app.

Numbers for the 2018 running of **Mid***Con* were slightly down on 2017. No one advanced any particular reason for not coming, but previous experience has suggested that Guy Fawkes parties and firework displays often provide a competing interest, particularly for families with children.

We are back to our more 'usual' slot for 2019 – Remembrance Sunday.

A slightly quieter event meant more room, and the overflow space in the Hallmark Inn was only lightly used, but we found that there is a group of people who actively like to be there for the extra space and peace that it provides. The Inn dining room is booked again for 2019.

The upstairs meeting rooms at the Inn have been converted into offices, so we were obliged to shift the second-hand games sale to the Aston Court hotel. This appears to have worked well, the layout making it easier for buyers to circulate. Persons selling games who were staying at the Inn were mildly inconvenienced, but a number of our players stay at the Aston Court anyway, and they might have favoured the change.

I also introduced a card reader at the convention registration desk. It was lightly used, but was handy for those who did wish to pay by card, and it provides the opportunity for us to provide emergency cash (for a small fee) for anyone who needs it (but there are several cash machines at the railway station).

After a slightly difficult start in January, when I had once again to chivvy the staff into getting them themselves organised for the convention, and a further hiatus during the summer when our discounted rate briefly vanished, I developed a good manager-manager relationship with the current General manager of the hotel. He clearly has a deep interest in us continuing to use the Inn and the Hotel, but is also concerned about two events that happened in 2018. The committee shares his concern, and I need to put these matters to those who attend the convention.

Personal Security

In 2018, for the first time that I can remember in the 40 years or so that I have been attending conventions, an outsider stole a bag of games worth several hundred pounds from one of the public rooms. Fortunately the games were recovered, and the thief apprehended.

Trust between players is a great thing, and we all know that the piles of games that line the games rooms are generally available for people to borrow, provided that permission is sought. Items have gone missing from time to time, but it is not generally thought to have been down to maliciousness.

The disappearance of a complete bag is upsetting to the owner, and embarrassing for the hotel management, and, sadly, it is necessary for everyone to become more security conscious about his or her personal property.

This means (a) challenging (politely) anyone who looks out of place, and who is acting suspiciously, and (b) closing the games room door if you are the last one out. This is mildly inconvenient, but the hotel staff can always unlock the doors, and at least one committee member will have a key card available.

Courtesy to Hotel Staff

There were two instances were some of our players displayed behaviour that was construed as abusive, once over a process issue, and once over a perceived personal slight.

The staff has a job to do, and they have prescribed ways of doing it, some of which we may find frustrating. However, abusing individuals will not help. If you do have a complaint, please raise it in a civil fashion, either with the hotel's Duty Manager or with a member of the **Mid***Con* committee, and we will try to sort it out. Shouting at people, or throwing crockery will only make matters worse, and won't resolve anything.

We will be putting these guidance notes on the information cards for the 2019 event.

MidCon Booking History

I am often asked how numbers 'this year' compare with previous years. Headcount is, for various reasons, not exact, but the graph below provides a general indication of how attendance has risen since 2003, when what is essentially the current committee took over.

I am appalled that we have been doing this for 15 years. Anyone want to take it over?

R	Subject	Details

Pete Mason won the 5 points for his team, so will be the player to beat next year.

Following on from last year's successful convention, ManorCon will once again be held at the University of Leicester. The gaming halls will remain at Stamford Court with accommodation nearby.

Please note: ManorCon does not start until 2pm on Friday. In recent years, people have been arriving earlier and earlier, to the extent that it has started to interfere with the convention preparation on Friday morning. The University needs to adapt the venue to our set up and thus it is unlikely that there will be space available for anyone arriving before 2pm.

As ever, single accommodation is available at the convention. All rooms are en-suite rooms. These will cost £44 per night, and £8 per night extra if you don't book in advance. As always, you are therefore recommended to book early to guarantee a room.

For those people who want twin accommodation, we recommend The Regency Hotel, which is just under a mile from the convention.
